- My supervisor, the director of collections -- and I would share this slides.
- We would need to see how to do this in WMS and what WMS has already implemented.
- I would share with the director and co-workers
- I've brought up with my library director including indigenous tribal names as keywords, but I want to discuss this with students, staff, etc
- I'll share this with the library assistants that help with cataloging, the next step for us will just be to implement it and get in into the maintenance schedule
- 8 of us from UNC-Chapel Hill, Wilson Library Special Collections. We would want to consult our colleagues in the main library, especially Tech Services.
- Reminding people that it is important to approach our work from the human perspective
- Diane Krall: My library has recently expanded its "world languages collection" to include residents who have immigrated from other countries. These catalog records would be a great place to start.
- At the Seattle Public Library, we have an internal message board that allows workers from across the system to discuss a range of topics. One colleague has already brought up the ableist/racist overtones of the Dewey Decimal system, and has sparked some dialogue about how to make our collection subjects more relevant/less harmful. I could continue this conversation by discussing what I've learned from this webinar, and gathering more worker support for updating our collection headings (at least in our branches)
- We would have to derive local subject headings and update them on a running basis
